

Important Information About Shingles Vaccination



What is shingles?

- Shingles is caused by the same virus as chickenpox.
- You can get shingles later in life, even if you had chickenpox as a child.
- It causes a painful rash and nerve pain.
- Pain can last for months or years.
- Older people and those with a weak immune system are more at risk

Why get the vaccine?

- The vaccine helps stop you getting shingles.
- If you do get shingles, it will be milder.
- You are less likely to go to hospital.
- You are less likely to have long-term pain.

Who can get the vaccine?

You can get the vaccine if you:

- Were 65, 66 or 67 on 01 September 2025
- Were 70 to 79 on 01 September 2025
- Are 18 or over with a very weak immune system
- Are about to start treatment that weakens your immune system.
- Have had a stem cell transplant or CAR-T therapy in the last 2 years.

If you have recently had a stem cell transplant, wait 6 months before shingles vaccination.

Side Effects

Most side effects are mild and last 1 to 3 days:

- Sore, red or swollen arm
- Muscle pain
- Feeling tired or unwell
- Fever or chills
- Headache or upset stomach

At your appointment

Tell the vaccinator if you:

- had a transplant.
- had a bad reaction to a vaccine.
- are having or recently finished cancer treatment.

Bring:

- Your invitation letter.
- A list of medicines.

Ask:

- about other vaccines you may need
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Need extra help?

Let us know if you would like to:

- Change the date, time or clinic of your appointment.
- Arrange a quiet space for your vaccination.
- Request extra support at your appointment.
- Opt out of receiving letters about scheduled shingles vaccine appointments.

You can bring:

- A carer
- A sighted guide
- A translator
- An assistance dog

- Your nurse will need to see your Section 47 certificate.
- This is a legal document from your GP.
- Even if you have a welfare power of attorney, the nurse still needs the certificate.
